5th Grade Writing Benchmarks Across All Genres

By the end of 5th Grade students should be able to:

- Produce simple, compound, and complex sentences. (Master)
- Master a three paragraph writing piece with an introduction, body, and conclusion. (Master)
- Expand a three paragraph writing piece to a five paragraph piece with an introduction, three body paragraphs, and a conclusion. (Approaching)
- Using at least three details and elaboration for each detail in each paragraph. (Master)
- Add transition words in writing (Master)
- Use strong word choice (verbs and adjectives) to add description and vivid details. (Master)
- Write an introduction that provides a “hook” and topic statement. (Approaching)
- Add a closing paragraph to their writing. (Approaching)
- Maintain a style and tone appropriate to the writing task. (Approaching)
- Use conventional spelling for high-frequency and other studied words, and to add suffixes to base words. (e.g., sitting, smiled, cries, happiness) (Master)
- Use spelling patterns, rules, and generalizations (e.g., word families, position-based spellings, syllable patterns, ending rules, meaningful word parts) in writing words. (Master)
- Spell grade-appropriate words correctly, consulting references as needed. (Master)
